Vespers is the evening prayer of the Church. This is the hour of thanksgiving for the graces bestowed during the day of salvation that has just passed. In Sunday Vespers we review gratefully the history of God's kingdom in the Church and in individual souls. We see Christ our victorious King in his power (Ps 109); we hear of the fundamental laws of the kingdom: love (fear) of God, love of neighbor (Ps 111). There are two principal objects to our Vesper prayers: thanksgiving, and new courage to continue our pilgrimage.

From the homilies of Saint Bernard in praise of the Virgin Mary

You have just heard, Blessed Virgin, that you are to conceive and bear a son, not by human intervention, but by the power of the Holy Spirit.

O Mary, do be quick and let us have your answer! Make haste, and let the angel have your reply — or rather, give it to the Lord himself, with the angel for your messenger. One word from you, and the Word himself will be yours; say what you are free to say, and God will take up his abode within you. One word from you which vanishes into the air, and soon you will hold in your arms the ever-living God.

Why do you delay? What have you to fear? Believe, praise, and accept what the Lord has told you. Temper your humility with a little boldness, your feeling of inadequacy with trust. There never was a moment when virginal innocence was so urgently called upon to cast discretion to the winds. No need for you, wise Virgin, to fear presumption in a matter such as this, for though your retinence reveals a becoming modesty, your love of us requies that silence should give place to speech.

O Blessed Virgin, open your heart and let faith enter in; open, too, your lips in praise and your womb to enshrine your Creator. See how he whom all the nations desire stands at the threshold of your door and knocks. What a pity if he should pass on because you are slow to open it, and you have to begin once again to seek in sorrow him whom your soul loves! Bestir yourself, and run quickly to open the door to him. Rise up, by believing what he has told you; run, by offering yourself to his service; open, by sing his praises.


