SUNDAY AT FIRST VESPERS

Psalter: Week I

A glimpse into the kingdom of God


Vespers is the evening prayer of the Church. This is the hour of thanksgiving for the graces bestowed during the day of salvation that has just passed. In Sunday Vespers we review gratefully the history of God's kingdom in the Church and in individual souls. We see Christ our victorious King in his power (Philippians Ct.), and God's care over his chosen ones (Ps 140 & 141), especially in time of danger and trouble. There are two principal objects to our Vesper prayers: thanksgiving, and new courage to continue our pilgrimage during the coming week.



Deus, Creator omnium. (L.M.)

- C 1. O God, Creator of the world, Its Ruler, gracious and supreme, You beautify the day with light, And night with morn and stars' fair gleam.
- A 2. Repose for bodies worn by toil, Our strength and vigor will repair, While sleep restores the wearied mind, And disipates all anxious care.
- C 3. We thank you for the day now spent, For coming night we grace implore, We sing a hymn to beg your help In our resolve to sin no more.

All: As a millstone is shattered to pieces on the **ground**, *


so their bones were strewn at the mouth of the grave.

Final petition


Cantor: To you, Lord God, my eyes are turned: * in you I take refuge; spare my soul!







Psalm 141

You, Lord, are my refuge

This psalm is the prayer of a man who is sorely tried. The Christian soul can pour into it her desire for deliverance from the dungeon of the body and sin. The psalm is also an excellent prayer for the hour of death, and as such it was used by St. Francis of Assisi.

What was written in this psalm was fulfilled in our Lord's passion (Saint Hilary)

First strophe: cry of one suffering

Cantor: With all my voice I cry to the Lord, *

with all my voice I entreat the Lord.

All: I pour out my trouble before him; *

I tell him all my distress

Cantor: while my spirit faints within me. *

But you, O Lord, know my path.

All: On the way where I shall walk * they have hidden a snare to entrap me.

Cantor: Look on my right and see: * there is no one who takes my part.

All: I have no means of escape, * not one who cares for my soul.

Second strophe: plea of one suffering

Cantor: I cry to you, O Lord. /

I have said: "You *are my* refuge, * all I have left in the land of *the* living."

All: Listen, then, to my cry *

for I am in the depths of distress,

Cantor: Rescue me from those who pursue me, *

for they are stronger than I.

All: Bring my soul out of this **pris**on * and then I shall praise *your* **name**.

Cantor: Around me the just will assemble *

because of your goodness to me.

All: Glory to the Father, and to the Son, *






