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

Vespers is the evening prayer of the Church. This is the hour of thanksgiving for the graces bestowed during the day of salvation that has just passed. In Sunday Vespers we review gratefully the history of God's kingdom in the Church and in individual souls. We see Christ our victorious King in his power (Philippians Ct.), and God's care over his chosen ones (Ps 112 & 115). There are two principal objects to our Vesper prayers: thanksgiving, and new courage to continue our pilgrimage during the coming week.






The First Coming: It is Mary who gives us Jesus: "Blessed are you, O Mary . . . those things shall be accomplished in you, which were spoken to you by the Lord."

It is from Bethlehem that the King, the Ruler, shall go forth who is to bring peace to all the nations, and who will deliver his people from the power of their enemies. In a special way our souls will share in this deliverance during the Christmas celebrations which mark the anniversary of the entrance into the world of Christ, the vanquisher of Satan. "Grant, we beseech you," the Church prays, "that the new birth of your only begotten Son may set us free, whom the old bondage holds under the yoke of sin." In the same way that St. John the Baptist prepared the Jews for the coming of the Messiah, so he prepares us for the union, closer every year, which our Lord forms with our souls at Christmas. "Make straight the way of the Lord," cried the forerunner of Christ. So let us make straight the way into our hearts, that our Savior may enter and give us his graces of life and freedom.

The Second Coming. It is our Lord's coming at the end of the world that St. Gregory alludes in his explanation of the Gospel: "John," he says, "the forerunner of the Redeemer, goes before our Lord in the spirit and power of Elijah who will be the forerunner of Christ as Judge." If we feel great joy at the approach of the Christmas feast, reminding us more of the lowly infant in the Manger, how much more should the thoughts of his Coming in all the splendor of his power and majesty fill us with a holy sense of triumph, since only then will our redemption be fully accomplished.

St. Paul writes to his Christians: "Rejoice in the Lord always: again, I say, rejoice . . . The Lord is near." As on Laetare Sunday in Mid-Lent, the priest may celebrate in rose-colored vestments. Rose is a paler kind of violet; it expresses some relaxation in penance, owing to the joy of the heavenly Jerusalem into which our Lord will lead us when time shall be no more. "Rejoice, O Jerusalem, with great rejoicing, for there shall come unto you a Savior." Let us greatly desire this coming which the Apostle tells us is near. We should long with a holy impatience that it may quickly come to pass. "Stir up, O Lord, your might, and come to save us." "Come, O Lord, and do not delay." "Through your Advent, deliver us, O Lord."
